On Nov. 3, Avelo Airlines announced Dubuque as the newest city in its network with exclusive nonstop service to Orlando International Airport (MCO). Service will begin Jan. 11 with flights offered twice weekly on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Since taking flight in April 2021, Avelo has flown more than 1.3 million customers on more than 10,000 flights. Introductory one-way fares between Dubuque Regional Airport and MCO start at \$59.

Iowa Transitioning to Flat-Rate Income Tax

Last March, Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds signed into law new tax reform with significant changes that will be phased in over the next four years. Once fully phased in, Iowa is expected to have a 3.9 percent single-rate (flat) individual income tax, a 5.5 percent flat corporate income tax, and no inheritance tax or alternative minimum taxes.

In 2023, Iowa will have four income tax brackets which will determine when your tax rate will lower to 3.9 percent. The changes will be phased in as follows:

- 2023: Top rate lowers to 6% for those making \$75,000 or more.
- 2024: Top rate lowers to 5.7% for those making \$30,000 or more.
- 2025: Top rate lowers to 4.82% for those making \$6,000 or more.
- 2026: Top rate lowers to 3.9% for all taxpayers.

Also starting in 2023, Iowans won't have to pay state taxes on retirement income.

Citizen's Police Academy Coming Soon

The Dubuque Police Department will hold the 26th annual Citizen's Police Academy (CPA) on Thursday evenings from Feb. 9, to April 13. The purpose of this program is to build a better understanding between residents and police through education.



The CPA is a 10-week program and participants are strongly encouraged to commit to attending all sessions. CPA sessions are taught by local law enforcement professionals and other members of the criminal justice system. Each session covers a variety of topics, including arrest procedures, search and seizure, use of force, laws and policies, police procedures, domestic abuse cases, sexual abuse cases, drug enforcement, OWIs, officer safety, and prevention programs.

Requirements for participation:

- Must be at least 18 years of age
- No felony convictions
- No significant arrest history

Space is limited. Applications are due by Friday, Jan. 20, and can be found at www.cityofdubuque.org/police. Paper applications are available at the Dubuque Police Department at 770 Iowa St.

Preference will be given to Dubuque residents. The CPA does not certify participants as law enforcement officers. For more information on the CPA, contact Lieutenant Brendan Welsh at 563-589-4473 or Captain Steve Radloff and 563-587-3807.

VITA: Free & Reliable Tax Help

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program offers free and reliable tax help to people who generally make \$58,000 or less, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English-speaking taxpayers. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation to those who need assistance in preparing their own tax returns.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CITY MANAGER

As 2022 comes to a close, the City of Dubuque is preparing not only for 2023, but the 2024 fiscal year.

The City's budget is a process to determine the allocation of available resources among departments, activities, programs, and initiatives. There is never enough money to be able to appropriate all the funds requested to all departments and activities and, as a result, there is considerable analysis and deliberation related to allocating available funds. The challenging goal of the City of Dubuque's budget process is to develop an acceptable balance between costs and services.

Staff in all City departments have been developing their budgets throughout the fall months and, in February, I will submit my recommended budget for the 2024 fiscal year (July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024) to the mayor and city council for their consideration. The mayor and city council will then hold a series of seven public meetings on the recommended budget throughout March. Residents and stakeholders are invited to attend or view these meetings and provide input before the final budget is adopted by the mayor and city council. (The State of Iowa's deadline for cities to adopt a budget for the next fiscal year is March 31.) The current fiscal year's budget features a lower property tax rate than the previous year for all property owners (the lowest of all of Iowa's largest cities) and decreased average property tax costs for commercial, industrial, and multi-residential properties. These decreases were achieved while still maintaining adequate general fund reserves (\$17.7 million) for unexpected expenses as well as continuing to reduce the City's total debt, cutting it to 41 percent of Dubuque's statutory debt limit.


The City of Dubuque, Dubuque County, Dubuque Community School District, and Northeast Iowa Community College are the local taxing bodies that determine local property tax rates for Dubuque properties and those taxes are an important source of revenue. Income taxes are determined and collected by the state and federal governments. Iowa's income tax will change significantly over the next four years. Please see the related article on page 1.

I encourage you to get involved and participate in the upcoming Fiscal Year 2024 budget process.

Study Finds Diversion Opportunities

The Dubuque Metropolitan Area Solid Waste Agency (DMASWA) recently received the results of an Iowa Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) study of materials being dumped at the landfill. The DNR inspected samples of loads from both residential and commercial/industrial customers from Dubuque County.

The findings indicate that many items that could be diverted are being landfilled, which can reduce the landfill's lifespan and increase methane production, a major greenhouse gas.



Organics: food waste & yard waste

Construction: wood, carpet, furniture

Paper: cardboard, etc.

Plastic: shopping bags, plastic bottles

Consumer Products (CP): clothes, rubber, electronics

Other: Diapers, inorganics

Metal: cans, scrap metal

Glass: bottles, jars

Household Hazardous Materials (HHM): batteries, paint

The study found that organics constituted the largest percentage of material in the samples at nearly 24 percent. Other notable materials that are reusable, recyclable, or compostable were also high on the list with paper being the third-most prevalent and plastic the fourth.

"We have convenient options to handle these materials sustainably," DMASWA Administrator Ken Miller said. "We need customers to do their part and use them."

"Know Before You Throw"

The City offers many options to properly divert waste from the landfill. Visit www.cityofdubuque.org/rethinkwaste to find if a material can be reused, recycled, composted, or how to properly dispose of it.

Winter Food Scraps & Yard Waste Collection

Residents who would like to have yard waste and food scraps collected during the winter months can schedule an appointment by either submitting a request through the City's website at www.cityofdubuque.org/yardwaste, or calling the City of Dubuque Public Works Department at 563-589-4250. Current food scrap cart subscribers will have collections made weekly on their normal collection day, no appointment needed.

Merry Mulch: January 1 - 12

City crews will pick up natural Christmas trees (maximum of 8' high) with a City brush tie or one yellow yard waste sticker attached and visible from the street or alley on your regular collection day.
