America's River Festival 2007

America's River Festival returns this summer to the Port of Dubuque on June 8-10. The festival welcomes the return of music for all ages and ears!

Taking the main stage Friday, June 8, at 9 p.m. will be Grammy Award Winner **Randy Travis**. Travis is best known for the songs "Forever & Ever, Amen" and "If I Didn't Have You." Travis' beloved classic hymns and bluegrass and country instrumentation is complimented by his unmistakable baritone voice.

The **Doobie Brothers**, known for blues-based songs with a rock edge, will take the main stage at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 9. Familiar tunes include "Black Water," "China Grove," and "Listen to the Music." The Doobie Brothers' tour this summer includes New York, Florida, Washington, and Dubuque!

Don't forget the kids! Children will have plenty of opportunities to enjoy themselves in the **Children's Area** devoted to them. Included

in this area will be a variety of interactive games such as a giant slide, bounce houses, air brush tattoos, and a 25-foot mobile rock wall.

From 8 a.m. to noon on Sunday, June 10, the Dubuque Humane Society will host their 15th annual pledged dog walk, the **Grand Pet Excursion** on the Riverwalk at the Port of Dubuque. With a variety of booths and events for your pup, you'll want to be a part of the activity.

Utility Charges for Outside Watering

With summer quickly approaching, the City's Utility Billing staff often receive questions regarding outside watering. Below are responses to the most frequently asked questions.

How can I avoid sewer charges for outside watering?

Customers can install a water only meter in addition to their main meter that measures consumption for outside watering of lawns, shrubs, pool fills, etc. Another option for large pool fills is to contact Water Distribution at 589-4304 and request to have your pool filled. The customer will be billed for both labor and water.



What is a water-only meter?

A water-only meter is a separately installed meter that only supplies water to lines where water will not enter the sanitary sewer system (typically outside faucets). The customer must purchase the water only metering equipment and have it installed by a licensed plumber. There is a minimum monthly charge for this meter.

Safe Options for Pharmaceutical Waste Disposal

Expired or unwanted non-narcotic prescription and over-the-counter medications from households have traditionally been disposed of by flushing them down the toilet or a drain. This is not recommended due to the possibility of surface and ground water contamination.

The recommended disposal method for non-narcotic prescriptions is:

1. *Keep the medication in its original container.*
2. *Modify the medications to discourage consumption.* For solid medications, such as pills or cap-

sules: add a small amount of water to partially dissolve them. For liquid medications: add table salt or flour to make a mixture that discourages anyone from drinking them. For blister packs: wrap the packages containing pills in multiple layers of duct or other opaque tape.

3. *Seal and conceal.* Tape the medication container lid shut with packing or duct tape and place it inside a container such as an empty yogurt or margarine tub to ensure that the contents cannot be seen. Do not conceal medicines in food products because they could be

Food Scrap Recycling

The City is expanding its pilot Food Scrap Recycling Program to add up to 150 new subscribers. The fee-based GreenCart Program offers residential and commercial customers a collection option to convert their garbage into compost. The program runs April through November. 4. After modifying medications properly, they can be discarded in the trash and sent to the landfill. Do not place in recycling bins!

CITY MANAGER'S COLUMN

On March 26, Mayor Roy D. Buol, with the Dubuque City Council, initiated a new City of Dubuque tradition as he presented Dubuque's inaugural "State of the City Address" in the Carnegie-Stout Public Library Auditorium. This public event, sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Dubuque and the Telegraph Herald, was held to enhance the City's communication with its citizens about the business of the City.

A capacity crowd filled the room and the event was aired live on Dubuque's local government access channel, CityChannel 8, and on KDTH AM 1370 radio.

During the address, Mayor Buol described Dubuque as a "community of character...a community that is indeed person-centered...where there is an awareness and appreciation developing for what makes each of us unique ... along with a

growing realization that healthy, vibrant communities do not hold themselves back with a 'one size fits all' mentality."

He also quoted Michelangelo, who once said, "I saw an angel in the stone and I carved it out to set it free!" I believe that Dubuque has begun to carve its stone."

Over the course of 40 minutes, Mayor Buol covered economic development, job growth, transportation, construction and real estate sales, education, neighborhoods, public safety, arts and culture, workforce, sustainability and the environment, legislative priorities, and the City budget.

In his closing, Mayor Buol said, "As we embrace 2007, with its known and unknown challenges and opportunities, let us always as a community choose action over inaction; bold ideas over the more safe, static ones. And while we

embrace our small town warmth, let us never think 'small.'"

"By asking the tough questions and honestly confronting the challenges, by looking for opportunities to volunteer and get involved, by treating one another the way we want to be treated and by sharing our time, talents and resources with others we are carving Dubuque's 'stone' and collectively contributing to a city known as Dubuque, the Masterpiece on the Mississippi!"

Mayor Buol's inaugural State of the City Address will be replayed on CityChannel 8 occasionally. DVD copies of the presentation may also be checked out from the Carnegie-Stout Public Library's Adult Services desk. City Rules and Regulations on Bicycles

With warm weather and summer fast approaching, the Dubuque Community Policing Unit is reminding residents of the rules and regulations regarding bicycles in the city of Dubuque.

EQUIPMENT:

- Each bicycle, when in use on city streets at anytime from sunset to sunrise, shall be equipped with a white, visible light on the front and a red, visible light on the rear.
- No person shall operate a bicycle unless it is equipped with functional brakes.
- Any police officer may inspect a bicycle for required safety equipment.

REGISTRATION:

- Every bicycle owned or ridden within the city is required to be licensed.

- Fees for bicycle licenses are \$5.00. This license is then valid for the length of time the bicycle is owned by the person to whom the license was issued.

RIDING A BICYCLE:

- No bicycle shall carry more passengers than the number for which it is designed. This is typically determined by the number of seats on the bicycle. Passengers are not allowed to ride on pegs attached to the wheels of the bicycle.
- A person riding a bicycle upon a sidewalk or in a crosswalk must yield the right of way to any pedestrian.
- Every person driving a bicycle on a street has all of the rights and duties applicable to

the driver of a motor vehicle. This means that while operating a bicycle on the street, the driver is expected to obey all traffic laws (including stopping at all stop signs and red lights, driving on the right side of the road, etc.)



In an attempt to educate children regarding bicycle safety, the Dubuque Police will participate in Finley Hospital's annual Bike Rodeo on Saturday, May 12, at Flora Park from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

Additionally, during the summer months the police department typically sees an increase in bicycle thefts. Please take precautionary measures such as licensing your bicycle and locking it up when not in use. ■

Dubuque Flags Available

The City is now offering for sale 3' x 5', ready-to-hang, nylon Dubuque flags. The light blue, green, and yellow flags bear the City seal and can be seen flying at most City facilities. The cost, which includes the City's cost plus shipping charges, is \$48.59. To order a flag, or for more information, call the Finance Department at 589-4131. ■
