

Are You Covered?

Are you in need of healthcare coverage? Do you have questions about health insurance options now available as part of the Affordable Care Act?

Health insurance can be confusing but the Crescent Community Health Center has trained staff available to review your health insurance needs, free of charge. They can answer your questions and help you sign up for coverage through Iowa Health and Wellness Plans (Medicaid). They can also assist with the Health Insurance Marketplace, also known as the health insurance "exchange," which helps uninsured people find health coverage. Flashing Yellow Left-Turn Arrow Traffic Signals Introduced to Dubuque Streets

Dubuque motorists may have noticed a new type of signal added to some traffic lights as part of recent construction projects. The flashing yellow left-turn arrow signal is a new traffic management tool aimed at keeping traffic moving, increasing safety, and reducing fuel consumption.

The new signal features a flashing yellow left-turn arrow, in addition to a red, green and steady yellow arrow. The flashing yellow arrow replaces the circular green signal used in the traditional left-turn signal configuration to indicate the need for left-turning vehicles to yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians.

A flashing yellow arrow means left turns are permitted, but motorists must first yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians, and then proceed with caution. The flashing yellow arrow does not replace the solid yellow arrow and its meaning; it does replace the green "ball" indication as a signal for a yielding left turn.

Drivers approaching a flashing left-turn arrow should stop at the intersection and yield to oncoming traffic. If, and when, it is safe, drivers may turn left and proceed through the intersection. When the available time for the flashing yellow arrow ends, the solid yellow left-turn arrow begins. The solid yellow retains

its standard meaning – the left turn signal is about to go to red, so drivers must prepare to stop or complete a left turn if already in the intersection.

The flashing yellow arrow may be used at any intersection at any time, but the most typical use will be at intersections and time-of-day that have lower traffic volumes, lower traffic speeds and other favorable conditions.

The City of Dubuque Engineering Department plans to replace many of the city's existing "yield-on-green" ball signals with the flashing yellow arrow.

Steady Red Arrow

Drivers turning left must stop and wait.

Steady Yellow Arrow

The left-turn signal is about to turn red. Do not enter the intersection if you can stop safely. Complete your left turn if you are already within the intersection.

Flashing Yellow Arrow

Yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians; then turn left, proceeding with caution. Oncoming traffic has a green light.

Steady Green Arrow

Drivers can proceed with the left turn. Oncoming traffic must stop. Do not go straight. §

Dubuque Named a Top 10 City for Tech Jobs
Continued diversification of Dubuque's economy and employer base, and our ability

to keep and attract the workforce our businesses need today and tomorrow, are critical to Dubuque's future.

SmartAsset.com, a New York-based firm, recently named Dubuque one of the 10 best American cities in which to work in technology. Dubuque ranks ninth in a list topped by Omaha, Neb., a city boasting five Fortune 500 companies.

The ranking is based on wages and cost of living for 200 cities, ranking them on pay for technology workers, percentage of technology workers in the workforce, and low cost-of-living indices. The total of these three rankings became the cities' overall tech industry scores.

The blog described Dubuque: "Dubuque is one of the hilliest cities in the otherwise flat state of Iowa. Besides its picturesque geography, Dubuque has a large number of manufacturing firms which require the precision that the tech industry can provide in order to turn out products like heavy farm machinery. Dubuque has low unemployment, at 4.3 percent, compared to the 6 percent national average. Tech workers there make 1.86 times more than the city average, the highest ratio on our top 10 list." §
