Recreational Fires

Make it a Safe Summer

Gathering around the backyard fire pit on a warm summer's night is an enjoyable summer activity. The City's recreational fire ordinance is designed to make the experience safe and enjoyable for all residents.

In Accordance with the City of Dubuque, Code of Ordinances, Section 19.7, the restrictions on recreational fires are as follows:

- 1) Physical containment of the fire must be used and adequate separation from combustibles and vegetation.
- 2) Burning will be strictly limited to charcoal products or growing form wood, dried, split or sawn to lengths no greater than four feet.
- 3) No processed wood such as 2x4s, plywood, building materials, etc. may be burned.
- 4) Fires are to be kept to a small size with flame height under five feet.
- 5) Burning of paper, garden wastes, rubbish, refuse, grass, leaves or brush is prohibited.
- 6) Atmosphere conditions should be such that allows for smoke and

Flora and Sutton Pools UV Disinfection Systems

The City of Dubuque Leisure Services Department has installed additional ultraviolet (UV) light disinfection systems in both Flora and Sutton Swimming Pools to reduce the risk of recreational waterborne illnesses which may be transmitted through swimming pool water.

The UV systems were installed in the main pools at Flora and Sutton in addition to the UV systems installed in the water playground wading pools last season. These completely contained UV systems are part of the pool recirculation system that will kill parasites such as cryptosporidium (crypto), giardia, and others as the pool water flows through the unit during each cycle. The UV light disinfection systems work in conjunction with renovated chlorine disinfection systems.



gasses to rise up and away. If smoke, gasses, and the fire become a nuisance, the fire must be extinguished.

- 7) Complaints will be directed to the Fire Department through 911 Dispatch. §



Even with this equipment upgrade and change in procedures, the City asks pool patrons to assist in combating the spread of recreational waterborne illnesses by following these guidelines:

- shower before swimming;
- wash hands after visiting the restroom or changing diapers;
- change diapers in the locker rooms, not poolside;
- take children on bathroom breaks and change diapers often;
- individuals with diarrhea, abdominal/stomach cramps, or nausea should not visit the pools;
- do not swallow pool water – the crypto parasite must be ingested to be spread.

These changes in operational and pool patron procedures will help prevent recreation water illnesses from occurring in public pools this summer. For more information, please contact the Park and Recreation Division at 589-4263 or parkrec@cityofdubuque.org. §

Masterpiece on the Mississippi

Art on the River 2009 Exhibit Chosen

The City of Dubuque has announced the selection of 10 pieces of outdoor sculpture for the 2009 Art on the River Exhibition. In its fourth year, the temporary public art exhibit drew 68 entries from 36 artists in 11 different states. The pieces will be installed along the Mississippi Riverwalk at the Port of Dubuque in July 2009 with an opening event set for Wednesday, July 15, at 5:00 p.m. at the Grand River Center.

Sculptures for the Art on the River exhibit are chosen by a panel of three highly qualified jurists, one from the Dubuque community and two from outside the community. Jurists for the 2009 competition were Jeff Boshart, MFA, Delores Fortuna, MFA, and Douglas Schlesier, MFA.

Art on the River is part of the Dubuque City Council's Arts and Culture initiative. Working in conjunction with the Arts and Cultural Affairs Advisory Commission, the Dubuque Museum of Art, and a volunteer committee made up of artists, educators, and city staff, the City has identified 10 highly visible locations at the Port of Dubuque to display selected artwork for a temporary exhibit that changes each year. A locally produced video entitled "Diverse Dubuque: A Focus on National Origin" recently received the Iowa Motion Picture Association's Award of Excellence in the Corporate and Community Marketing category. The video was completed in fall 2008 by Loras College Productions for the National Origin subcommittee of the Dubuque Human Rights Commission. The video explores the modern-day immigrant experience in our community. The film focuses on local residents who have chosen to make Dubuque their home, and is designed to remind us that we are a nation of immigrants sharing common human interests. The successes being achieved in Dubuque continue to be recognized regionally and nationally. Most recently,

the U.S. Economic Development Administration awarded Dubuque its Excellence in Economic Development Award for "Excellence in Historic Preservation-Led Strategies" for the IBM/Roshek Building project.

In May, the Iowa Historic Preservation Alliance (IHPA) announced its 2009 "Preservation At Its Best" Awards to honor individuals, organizations, projects, and programs whose work demonstrates a commitment to excellence in historic preservation. Of the eight statewide awards, four were awarded to Dubuque projects!

- **Community Effort Category:** Washington Neighborhood Revitalize! Initiative/Washington Neighborhood Association – For the Washington Neighborhood's combined effort to improve historic buildings and revitalize their neighborhood.

- **Small Commercial Category:** Gronen Restoration & Mike Steele – For the rehabilitation of the former German Bank Building, 342 Main Street.
- **Large Commercial Category:** Cottingham & Butler – For the rehabilitation of the Security Building, 800 Main Street.
- **Sustainability in Preservation Category:** The Durrant Group – For the rehabilitation and sustainable reuse of the former Adams Company manufacturing building, 400 Ice Harbor Drive into the company headquarters.

Historic preservation is keystone to Dubuque's approach to sustainability because the most sustainable building is the one that is already built. Congratulations to the organizations and individuals involved in these projects for this well-deserved recognition.

Dubuque is home to many wonderful sites and attractions, but I always tell guests and visitors that no visit to Dubuque is complete without a visit to Eagle Point Park.
