City Begins Closed Captioning Council Meetings and Select Programs

As part of the City's efforts to make Dubuque a more inclusive and equitable community, closed captioning will be added to broadcasts of Dubuque City Council meetings and some other CityChannel Dubuque programs beginning in July.

Although captioning will not be done live, Cable TV Division staff will add closed captioning, transcribed by a professional service, to the videos that air on CityChannel Dubuque and to the online archives available on the City's website at www.cityofdubuque.org/media. Depending on the length of the meeting, the closed captions should be available on the Thursday following a Monday City Council meeting.



Captioned videos archived online will be designated by a "CC" at the end of the program title. Residents wishing to view the captions should turn them on by clicking on the small "CC" visible when mousing over the lower right-hand corner of the online video player. Residents wishing to view them while watching CityChannel Dubuque (cable channel 8 or digital 117.2) should turn on closed captions the same way they would for any other broadcast television program. §

New Changes to Park Pavilion Rentals

The Leisure Services Department is adjusting the rental fees and advance reservation schedule for the department's park pavilions. Most pavilion fees will be increasing due to a new standardization of fees based on seating capacity groupings. Park pavilions have been categorized into four seating capacity groups: 1-25, 26-50, 51-100, and 100+. This is the first increase in pavilion rental fees since the early 1990s.

The maximum advance reservation has been reduced from 23 months in advance of an event to 11 months in advance.

for more accurate revenue tracking. Additionally, due to overcrowding issues or lack of reservations, some pavilions will no longer be available to reserve.

Park pavilions are available to rent from the first Saturday in May through the fourth Saturday in October. To reserve a park pavilion, please visit www.cityofdubuque.org/parks, select the park you'd like to visit, and check pavilion capacity and fees. A MESSAGE from the CITY MANAGER

Community resilience is often defined as the sustained ability of a community to utilize available resources to respond to, withstand, and recover from adverse situations. This allows for the adaptation and growth of a community after disaster strikes.

As this newsletter goes to press in early June, the resilience of communities across the state and throughout the Midwest is being tested as they experience massive flooding problems due to relentless spring rainfall. The 12 months ending in April 2019 were the wettest year-long period in U.S. records going back to 1895, according to the monthly U.S. climate summary issued by the NOAA National Centers for Environmental Information.

The Mississippi River in the Quad Cities has been above major flood stage for the longest stretch ever recorded, even surpassing the "Great Flood of 1927." In fact, the river was in major flood stage there for 51 consecutive days, from March 23 through May 12. The previous record was 31 days from mid-April to mid-May 2001, according to the National Weather Service. The City of Davenport reported that its costs for flood-fighting efforts have exceeded \$1 million. That estimate

does not include private sector costs or the costs of damages caused by the flooding and is expected to increase as additional rainfall has caused the river to stay high.

On the other side of the state, the Missouri River and its tributaries have been flooding southwest Iowa as well, breaking levees, closing interstates and other major roadways, and flooding communities and farms. The Des Moines Register reported more than 40 levee breaks in March alone and the Army Corps of Engineers said some repairs could take years.

In central Iowa, Des Moines experienced heavy rains in late May that led to flash flooding, street closures, and many flooded basements and/or backed-up sewers. To prevent new threats from flooding, the City of Des Moines is spending \$300 million to elevate levees along the Des Moines and Raccoon rivers because they are not currently tall enough.

It is very disheartening to see so many communities suffering through these conditions. Dubuque has been spared from similar experiences thanks

to significant public investments in infrastructure. Perhaps the most impactful investment to Dubuque's overall resiliency was the John C. Culver Floodwall (and related retention basins and pump stations), completed in 1973. The floodwall system has prevented hundreds of millions of dollars in flood damages and supported public and private investment. Continual monitoring and maintenance of the floodwall system is critical to flood protection as the river reaches flood stage more frequently.

More recently, Dubuque's investments in its stormwater management system and the adoption of best practices, including but not limited to the Bee Branch Watershed Flood Mitigation Project, are another example of increasing Dubuque's resiliency. This certainly was a wise use of city debt. In recent decades, heavy rainfalls like those experienced this spring would have caused flash flooding in numerous streets, flooded basements in multiple neighborhoods, and damaged public infrastructure. While these neighborhoods had six Presidential Disaster Declarations from 1999-2011, they did not have that same experience this time thanks to major investments by the Mayor and City Council to increase the capacity of Dubuque's stormwater system communitywide.

Continued investment in and maintenance of Dubuque's infrastructure is an important part of increasing public safety, promoting community resilience, and protecting public and private investment in the community. §
