I've talked to a number of people, most all of whom think the whole project is a waste of money. They think what we have is adequate.

I disagree with them. NOT ONLY does N. 5th get closed for any event (which would happen with most of the upgraded plans), but parking becomes difficult at best. In addition, there are many cultural (and not so 'cultural' performances which we MISS a chance at because of our 'small size venue'. I THINK Dubuque could compete favorably even with Des Moines and certainly Cedar Rapids and the Quah Cities if we had a large enough venue. We MIGHT have to find more hotel and hospitality (and there is room for building such downtown, particularly east of the Washington Park Neighborhood.) But I would think the largest of the options would be the best investment. IF you're going to invest, look for a GOOD return. (And, BTW, I would be for the People to have AT LEAST a 50% controlling interest. Facilities like this are MORE than just a profitmaking venture, to be abandoned as soon as the profit grows thin. With a public investment, we will be encouraged to CONTINUE thinking in terms of growth, not just profit!

What we have is adequate for what we get. I'm in favor or tearing it down and making a bigger venue to bring in bigger things that will attract more people to come to this city. We need more than the river museum and the 4th street elevator in this town to draw

people in. Dubuque has a long history but that doesn't bring in tourist like we think it does. The city relies on that and that alone and that's why this city has pretty much been stagnant for 50+ years. We haven't seen the growth that other cities have because they offer more to do.

I am against the larger plans that would involve the closure of 5th. The ability to connect up to Main Street, Locus, and Bluff from the streets further east (Iowa, Central, or from down at the river) would be a major disruption. Especially when coming south on Iowa and needing to get up to Locust or Bluff. Past the turn at 5th, one quickly gets trapped in the "triangle" of streets south of 5th, which is much harder to navigate in. That block on 5th next to FFCC is a very critical road link in my mind. I also just see us having enough "arena" events that would require such a huge new place. Your study doesn't provide the market analysis that would support that need.

Paul Hemmer – 5-16-18 Form

As a regular attendee at DSO concerts at Five Flags Theater I believe the most important immediate work to be done is replacing the uncomfortable seats on the mail floor and a major reconfiguration of the balcony. Seats are placed too close together with almost no knee room for the taller adults of today. And, I believe something should be done to capitalize on the historic significance of the "Majestic" as one of the finest early vaudeville houses in the country. Few realize that the architects, Rapp & Rapp, went on to design the famed Chicago theater and dozens of other significant theaters across the country. As for the arena - although the cost of maintaining is significant - I believe we should at least configure the interior to handle more seating. The city has

grappled with the "municipal auditorium" concept since at least the 1920's without every properly resolving the problems. If we can afford 1.5 million dollar roundabouts, \$250 million dollar storm sewer projects and 1/2 million dollar public toilets we should be able to do something significant for the long term cultural well-being of our city.
