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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The City of Dubuque (City) received a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Brownfields Hazardous Substances Cleanup Grant in 2016 to fund the remediation of the East Blum site generally identified as 501 East 15th Street in Dubuque, Iowa (site). The City entered into a cooperative agreement with the EPA to evaluate, design, and implement a permanent cleanup remedy for contaminated soils at the site. Conducting the referenced activities enable the City to 1) make a sound decision regarding the future use of the site and 2) meet the primary objective of the cleanup remedy. The work will ultimately mitigate potential human exposure risks while protecting the environment.

The purpose of this report is to document results of the public comment period and public meetings to include comments received and selection of the final cleanup remedy.

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 Site Location

The site contains two adjoining parcels generally identified as 501 East 15th Street in Dubuque, Iowa (refer to Appendix A). It is further located by the latitude 42.5089° North and longitude -90.6631° West. Information contained in Table 1 further describes the East Blum site.

2.2 Site History

Table 2 outlines previous uses of the site according to available historical records.

		Observations made during the site reconnaissance identified an incinerator, staining on the ground and stored material, and hydraulic equipment on the site. The site operated as a scrap yard/recycling business.
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2.3 Nature of Threat to Human Health and Environment

HR Green, Inc. prepared a Phase I ESA on the site in conformance with the scope and limitations of ASTM Practice E 1527-13 on behalf of the City as part of an EPA Brownfields Petroleum Assessment Grant. The report, dated December 1, 2015, recommended further investigation after identifying on- and off-site recognized environmental concerns (RECs).

HR Green, Inc. prepared a Phase II ESA on the site in conformance with the scope and limitations of ASTM Practice E 1903-11 on behalf of the City as part of the same EPA Brownfields Petroleum Assessment Grant. The report, dated December 4, 2015, identified the following impact in shallow soil:

- **Range 1 Soil:** Sample results identified eleven (11) polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon (PAH) compounds above laboratory reporting limits. Only benzo[a]pyrene at location SB5 was identified at a level *above* Statewide Standards (SWS). Sample results identified up to six (6) RCRA metals above laboratory reporting limits. Lead and arsenic at locations SB1, SB2 and SB5 were identified at levels *above* SWS.

The concentrations detected present an *unacceptable* cancer and non-cancer risk for a site resident, site worker, and construction worker.

The benzo[a]pyrene concentration detected during this study was above a former SWS of 0.31 mg/kg; however, when compared to the current SWS of 2.3 mg/kg the finding no longer exceeded the threshold. Additional screening for PAHs observed no exceedances. As such, benzo[a]pyrene is not a contaminant of concern on the site.

The Phase II ESA also assessed groundwater, vapor intrusion, and PCB contamination. The result from the vapor intrusion assessment and PCB testing did not identify an unacceptable risk to the site. While groundwater impact was identified, the City has an ordinance (Section No. 16-11-20) preventing the installation of private wells unless public water is unavailable. This action requires permit approval by the County's Health Department. Further, no wells may be installed within 500 feet of a LUST site. The County's Health Department prevents the installation of new wells on the site or adjacent properties. This action severs the groundwater ingestion pathway.

Ultimately, the results of the study indicated the site was not suitable for future residential, commercial, or industrial purposes without remediation of shallow soil. Further, surface material and asbestos abatement will require mitigation prior to building demolition.

3.0 PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD SUMMARY

Public participation is an important component to selecting an appropriate cleanup remedy. The City made a concerted effort to involve the community by disseminating information concerning options related to the removal of contaminated soil and engaging the public in meaningful dialog about redevelopment activities from September 14 to

December 15, 2017. Table 3 summarizes the duration and outcome of each outreach activity.

3.1 Project Website

The City created a webpage for the site that launched in late August 2017 (<https://www.cityofdubuque.org/1821/Flood-Mitigation-Maint-Facility>). The tool provided a repository of project documents such as the Community Relations Plan, ABCA, Phase I ESA, Phase II ESA, Asbestos Survey, and Smelter Asbestos Report; an overview on the City's plans to redevelop the site along the restored Bee Branch Creek and the related Brownfields cleanup process; and a summary of environmental benefits of the cleanup/redevelopment and how it supported the City's sustainability goals. It also offered citizens a chance to comment on specific re-use options for the site via an online form.

3.2 Presentation

Staff presented the project at the annual City Expo hosted on September 14, 2017. The event allows Dubuque residents to learn about City services and programs and features booths, displays, and equipment from City departments and divisions. Participants were encouraged to place a dot on their favorite re-use options for the site.

3.3 Paper Ballots

The City made paper ballots available at publicly owned facilities such as city hall to capture additional feedback re-use options. Staff received 66 completed forms in the process.

3.4 Results

Through a combination of public events, paper ballots, and online forms, the City received almost 600 responses focused on the types of activities and equipment that residents thought would best serve the community on the site (refer to Appendix A for a summary). The public voted for their three favorite concepts from the following list of twelve options and/or submit their ideas.

- Outdoor fitness equipment
- Universal access to the water
- Climbing opportunities
- Natural playscape
- Bike playground
- Outdoor gathering space
- Multi-sport court
- Large sand area
- Small park pavilion
- Unique turf playscape
- Traffic garden
- Community room

Preferred concepts included the natural playscape, climbing opportunities, a bike and scooter playground, access to the water, and outdoor fitness equipment. The proposed use of the site as recreational activity space was critical to informing and guiding the future cleanup process.

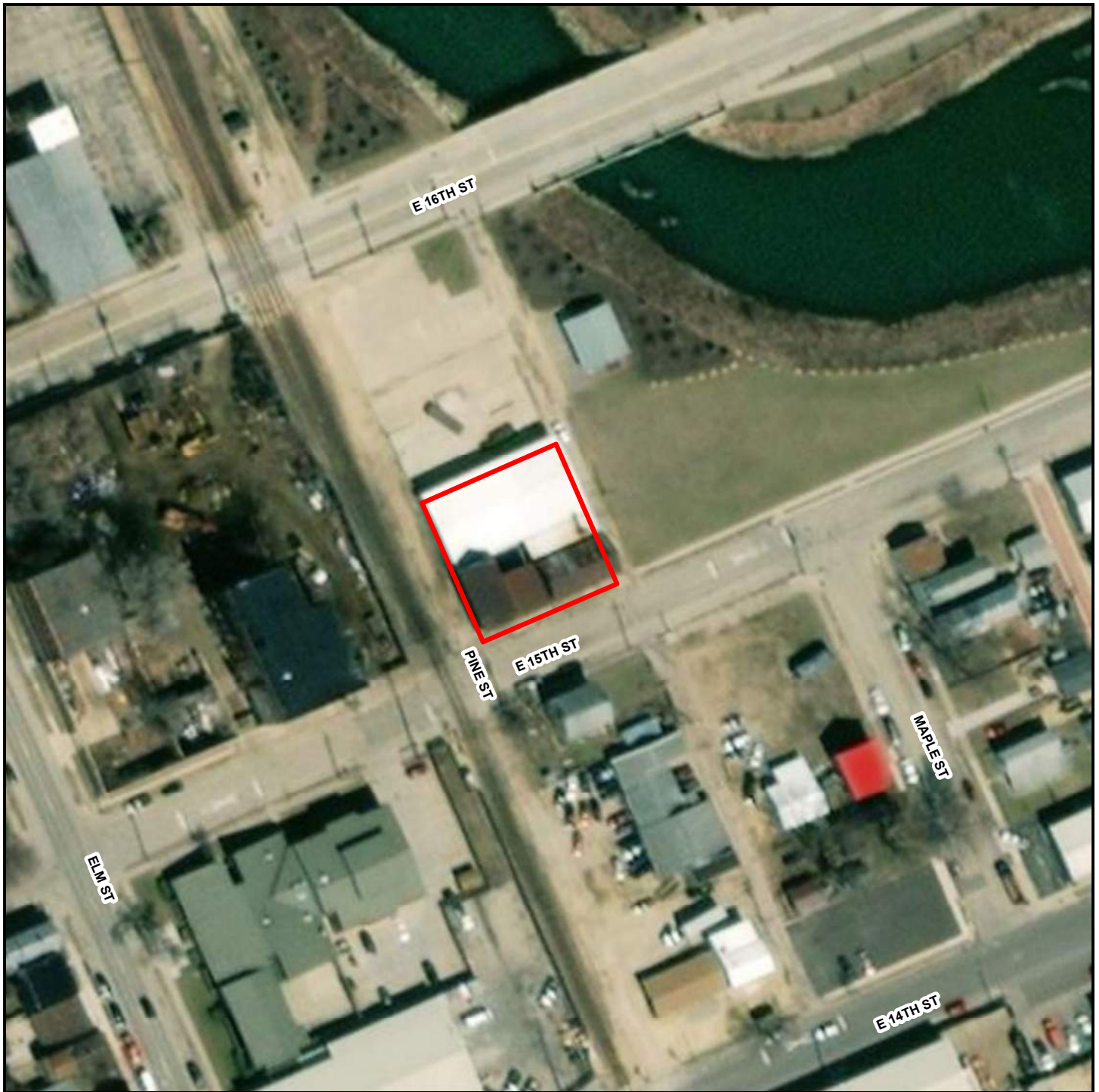
4.0 SELECTION OF FINAL CLEANUP REMEDY

Redevelopment plans for the site focus on recreational uses based on feedback gathered during the community outreach campaign. As such, remediation efforts must reduce exposure risks for future users of the new facility.

The City has already enrolled the site into the Iowa Land Recycling Program (LRP) to address the shallow soil impact in order to receive a No Further Action (NFA) certificate. The Iowa LRP specifies cumulative human health risk criteria that the project must comply with in order to acquire the certification. The removal of lead, arsenic, PAHs, and other contaminants at the Blum site will assist Dubuque in decreasing risks posed to human health. Proposed cleanup activities include the removal of impacted soil.

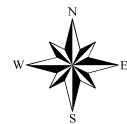

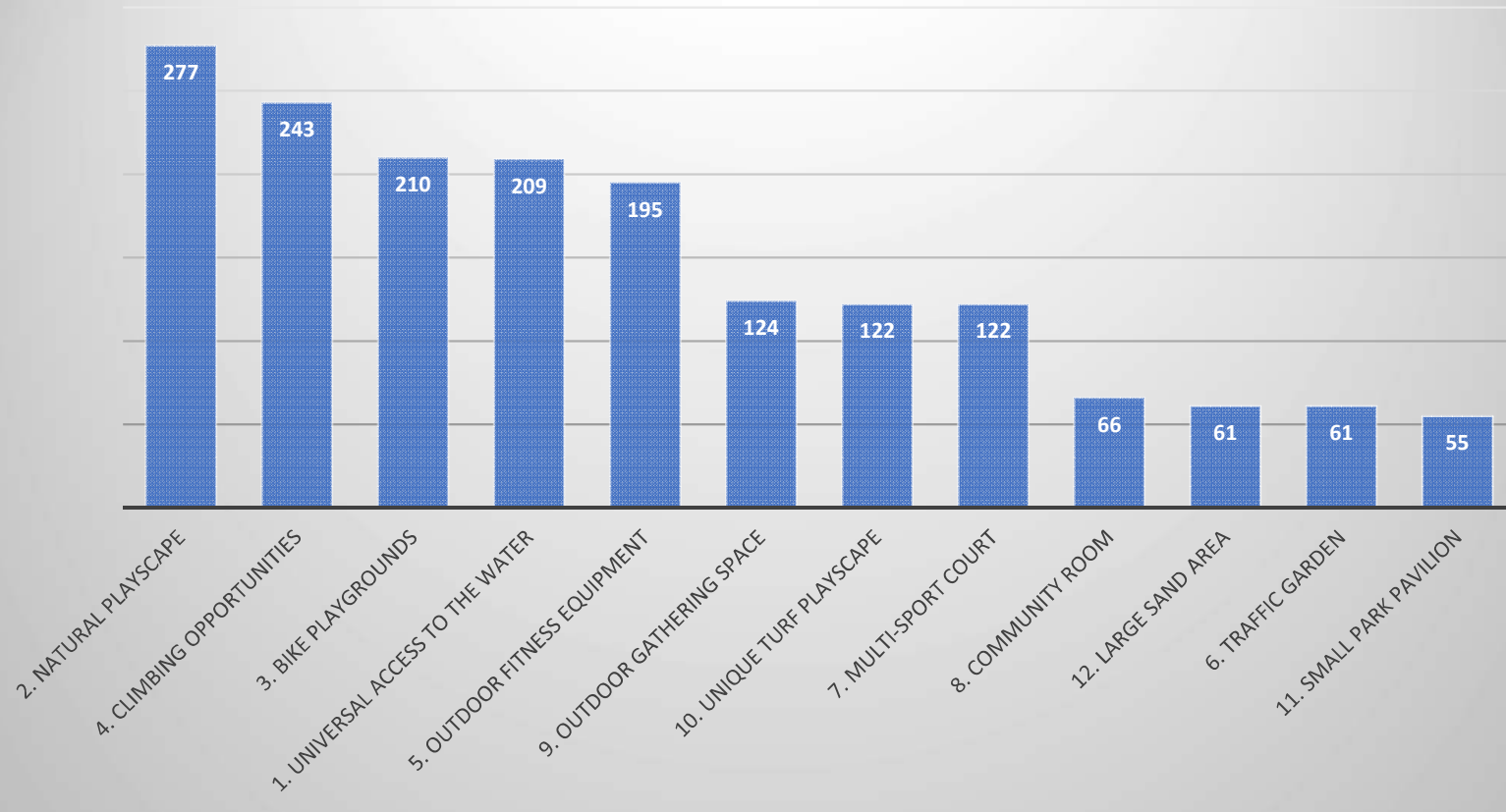

#1 needs to be expanded to include the possibility of using the waterway down through the Bee Branch for tubing or kayaking or even, if larger enough and when water is sufficient, some whitewater activity. And making the retention basin at the bottom of the waterway for small boating on sheltered water is a GREAT idea, especially for novice kayakers like my spouse!

#9 gives some good gathering space for the upper end of the city, like several other parks farther south (like Washington Park) give there.

My OWN personal preference, in addition to green space, is redevelopment of SOME structure in that area into a grocery store, perhaps with a business. Whichever idea is chosen, it would be advantageous to have the final product be ADA compliant/ inclusive to individuals with all kinds of abilities!!
